Good evening Everyone





Keynote Speaker

Amanda Johnston, Head of Business Development, Social Enterprise NI

Amanda runs regular training courses and facilitation on areas of social enterprise as a business model, and corporate governance. She is also an experienced fundraiser and has helped many organisations development business and strategic plans.

We were delighted when Amanda took time out from her busy schedule to attend our awards and speak to our nominees and their guests. Her personal, motivational and sincere speech, delivered with warmth and humour, was well-received by all! No doubt our local groups and charities signed up a few new young volunteers as a result!



Contribution to the Arts Award

The Education Committee was amazed at the range of artistic talent and accomplishments of this year's nominees in the Contribution to the Arts category. When choosing the finalists, the adjudication panel considered both accomplishment and the extent to which the nominee shares their talent and contribute to the creative development of others. After much deliberation, two runners-up and one winner were agreed.

Runner-up Elle Harrison

Runner-up Elle Harrison is an accomplished ballet student who has danced in Swan Lake, Beauty and the Beast, and White Doves. She is currently pursuing her qualification to teach ballet. Her commitment to ballet requires that she travels to Belfast sometimes four days a week after school.

At the Miss Mary Hill School of Ballet, Elle encourages her fellow pupils. She even taught herself Makaton to work with a Downs Syndrome ballet student who has very little verbal ability and leg movement.

For her achievements in ballet but especially for her work in promoting ballet, encouraging and motivating her peers, and sharing her love of ballet, Elle was chosen as runner-up.





Runner-up Grace McCaul

Multi-talented Grace McCaul is a talented public speaker who has won numerous public speaking competitions, including third place at the NI Annual Youth Award Public Speaking Competition. She is also an outstanding singer and actress and a valued member of the St Mary's College School Choir, where she regularly sings solo at concerts and community events. Recently, she won a place in the Northern Irish Youth Choir.

Grace was nominated for her outstanding talent, for sharing her talents at school and community events, and encouraging younger members of the school choir. For these reasons, Grace McCaul was chosen as a runner-up in the Contribution to the Arts Award category.

Winner Ben Farren

The winner of the Contribution to the Arts Award was Ben Farren who was nominated for his talent in and love for Irish Dancing and Ballet. In 2019 Ben was ranked 5th in the world in Irish dancing. Ben has won first place in a host of competitions and titles nationally and internationally. He was selected to dance with Riverdance in Dublin in 2022.

Ben shares his love of Irish dance within the community, performing at care homes and council events, and encouraging youngsters to work on their skills. He was invited to teach Irish dancing to learners in Boston in 2023.

In 2022 he began studying with the Miss Mary
Hill School of Ballet, where he also volunteers on
Saturdays, assisting young learners, particularly those
with additional needs.

For these many reasons, Ben Farren is the 2024 winner of the Contribution to the Arts Award.

Business & Entrepreneurship Award

Derry people are known for their shrewd business skills and our generation is no exception. The panel chose three finalists in this category: two successful entrepreneurs and one group of enthusiastic business pupils.



Runner-up Ava Foley

Business & Entrepreneurship Award runner-up Ava Foley was recognised for her baking business 'Ava's Bakes' which grew out of her passion for baking. Although Ava is self-taught, her high standard would make her a worthy competitor on the Bake Off. She designed her label and logo and promotes her business in her Instagram page.

Ava keeps a customer database, tracks her costs, and keeps separate cash totals for costs and another one for profit.

She does all of this while studying full-time - taking GCSE's this year - at Thornhill College. She is a very focused and driven young businesswoman who is committed to her craft and strives to produce the best products for her customers.

St Mary's College YENI Company

The St Mary's College Young Enterprise Company created their company Simply Tote which produced Positive Affirmation Tote Bags. They ordered sustainably sourced tote bags, and heat pressed their logo and bespoke design onto them. The bags were sold at lunchtimes.

At January's Young Enterprise Company Trade Fair, they won 'Best Instagram' and 'Best Social Media'.

Just as impressive as their business skills is how this group of girls, who had not worked together before, bonded and worked as a team to produce a popular product. For these reasons, the St Mary's College Young Enterprise Group was a runner-up for the Business & Entrepreneurship Award.

This category celebrates our young people who give up their time selflessly to care for others. In the next few pages, you will read about three local young people who have gone above and beyond to make space in their lives for others.

Runner-up Marcus Swerdlick

Without complaint or seeking praise, runner-up
Marcus Swerdlick cares for his father who suffers from
Motor Neurone Disease. He helps with the daily running
of their household and ensures his father is comfortable
and supported. He has had to quickly learn to cook,
clean and care for himself and his father. Marcus'
resilience is even more notable, given that he does all
this whilst also coping with the recent unexpected death
of his mother.

In school, Marcus's quick wit and humble personality endears him to all. He is always willing to listen to advice and thrives on praise and encouragement.



Runner-up Mary Kate Tierney

Carer Award runner-up Mary-Kate Tierney cares for her mother who was recently diagnosed with fibromyalgia and her younger brother who, like Mary-Kate, suffers from lymphoedema.

Lymphoedema is a condition that creates physical discomfort and daily challenges. Mary-Kate approaches each day with a positive attitude, and advocates for greater understanding and knowledge of her condition.

Mary-Kate is a pillar of strength and support for her family and demonstrates a maturity and resilience beyond her years. Her determination, kindness, and unwavering commitment to her family and peers serve as a shining example to all.



Winner Conor Roberts Lynch



The Carer Award Winner was Conor Roberts Lynch. In the summer of 2023, Conor's twin brother Adam experienced a severe accident that resulted in a life-altering back injury. During th six week Adam spent at Stoke Mandeveille Spinal Cord Injury Unit in London, Conor and his 19-year-old sister cared for their 3-year-old sister at home. Despite his worry and anxiety for his brother, Conor remained strong and resilient for the sake of his family.

It was challenging for Conor to continue with daily activities without Adam, as they had always been together. Before Adam's return home, Conor ensured the house was suitable for his brother's needs. Since Adam couldn't immediately return to school, Conor brought home schoolwork and helped him catch up on missed assignments. Conor also organized gatherings with their friends at their house to play Xbox and socialize. Conor prioritises Adam's emotional wellbeing, providing a listening ear for his twin and relaying information to his parents so that they can get the correct help and support for Adam when needed.

Conor is a resilient, caring, empathetic and kind young man who is an inspiration and role model for other young men and adults alike. For these reasons, Conor is the 2024 Winner of the Carer Award.

Courage Award

The following remarkable young people have faced challenges that many of us can only imagine -- and they have done so with a level of grit, resilience and optimism that make them role models for us all.

In a departure from previous years, our panel chose only winners this year.

Courage Award Winner Dearbhaile Brady

The first winner was Dearbhaile Brady. Dearbhaile was born seven weeks premature with dwarfism. The adversity and challenges she has overcome would put others to shame.

Dearbhaile has won 9 gold and one silver medal at the Dwarf Sports Association's UK National Games for track and field and swimming. A talented all-rounder, Dearbhaile's passion is swimming — a sport in which she has achieved numerous personal bests and won medals both nationally and internationally.

Despite all her success and talent, Dearbhaile reports that often people stare, make her feel uncomfortable or taunt her. Dearbhaile faces challenges and difficult situations daily which she faces head-on with her trademark smile. She also encourages other students with disabilities to take part in competitions.

For these many reasons Dearbhaile was chosen as a Courage Award winner.





Courage Award Winner Niall O'Doherty

Niall is a sixth-year pupil at Saint Brigid's College and a keen supporter of Derry City.

Niall suffers from Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy, a condition that can be challenging and lonely, particularly for a teenage boy. Over the midterm break he became a full-time wheelchair user. But despite the discomfort, pain and fatigue he experiences, Niall does not complain, and he refuses to let the condition define him. He remains focused on his studies and dreams of becoming a TV/radio presenter.

His nominator said that Niall's courage and determination are unwavering, and his classmates and peers hold him in high regard for his resilience and positive attitude. Niall is always upbeat and enjoys his jokes and banter. He is a big personality who keeps everyone on their toes!

An inspiration to those who know him, Niall was recognised as a Courage Award winner.

Courage Award Joint Winners Rebecca Ebbs and Zara Reid (not pictured)

Joint Courage Award Winners Rebecca Ebbs and Zara Reid displayed outstanding courage in May 2023 when they rescued two young girls in Buncrana who were in difficulties in the water. Rebecca and Zara were sunbathing when a woman asked if they could swim as she had spotted two girls in difficulty in the water. Without hesitation or consideration for their own safety, Rebecca and Zara entered the choppy water and, upon reaching the swimmers, turned the distressed girls onto their backs, placed their arms under the swimmers' arms and brought both to safety on the shore. The rescue services, who arrived soon after, commented that without the actions of the girls, it would have been a tragedy. Both swimmers were taken to hospital and made a full recovery.

Rebecca and Zara have been reluctant to accept any credit for their act of courage since and this why their school principals nominated them for a Courage Award. Our adjudication panel agreed that Rebecca and Zara were worthy Courage Award recipients.

Runner-up: James Tourish

St Columb's College pupil James Tourish was a runner-up in the Leadership Award category for a host of reasons. His impressive accomplishments include Winner of LifeWorks 2023 essay, member of The Net's Young Writer's Team, Head Prefect of St Columb's College, featured in the Irish Times in a piece about Education on the Troubles, and delivering a speech at the John and Pat Hume Foundation 'Making Hope and History Rhyme' event at which US President Bill Clinton was in attendance.

James has a strong belief in doing and saying what is right, even in the face of adversity. He leads by example in all aspects of school life, particularly in terms of spiritual leadership both inside and outside of school.

'Swap with Style' is a series of swap shops where staff and pupils can exchange items

of high-quality clothing. Their first swap show was so successful that two more swap shops were planned this academic year and it is the group's hope that other schools will follow suit. Swap with Style is through to the Young Environmentalist Awards semifinals in Armagh, and the group hope to reach the finals in Dublin in May.

Leadership Award Winners: Thornhill College Rights Respecting Ambassadors

Formed in September 2023, the Rights
Respecting Ambassadors of Thornhill College
received a Leadership Award for their passion
and commitment to placing the United Nations
Convention on the Rights of the Child at the
core of their school's ethos and ensuring that
rights are respected, learned, taught, practiced,
and promoted by and for all. They received the
UNICEF Rights Respecting Schools Bronze Award
in December and are now working towards the
Silver Award.

Highlights of their work this year include hosting the Northern Ireland Children's Rights Commissioner for a town hall style meeting, leading monthly 'rights focused' assemblies, delivering a month-long celebration of



International Women's Rights in March, working on a "21st Century Suffragettes" campaign to get everyone over the age of 16 registered to vote, and working with the Northern Ireland Anti-Bullying Alliance to become Anti-Bullying Ambassadors.


Winner Reuben Connor

Leadership Award Winner Reuben Connor is a year 10 pupil in the Autism Specific Classroom of St Joseph's Boys School. Since Year 8, he has blossomed from a shy and quiet boy to become a confident pupil who is top in his class in most of his mainstream classes. Now a friendly, sociable boy, he is liked by all in the school.

Reuben is a shining example of leadership. He exemplifies hard work, commitment, and good manners. A Prefect of the Autism Specific Class, he is a past winner of the St Joseph's Award for his work ethic. He helps both the younger boys in the Autism Specific Classroom and in his mainstream classes with their work when they are struggling. He is also the first to notice if any boy in the school is upset and tries to help them or let an adult know that they are upset.

On the side, Reuben has a passion for trains and buses, and launched his own YouTube channel 'Bus and Train Spotter NI' which has attracted a few hundred subscribers. His passion for his hobby led to him achieving an NI Road Safety award for his work with Translink.

For these many reasons, Reuben was recognised with a Leadership Award.

The Contribution to Sport Award

This year's finalists represent a variety of sports: Martial Arts, athletics, football and Gaelic. While their sports differed, they shared the same sense of discipline and dedication that drives them to success. Importantly, they also shared their talents and tips for success with others.

Runner-up Clara Casey

Runner-up Clara Casey started her journey as a sportswoman at age seven. A superb cross-country runner and netballer, she is also a county Gaelic footballer playing for Doire U-14 and U-16 and an Ulster and All-Ireland 800m champion and Ulster cross-country champion. Clara represented Ireland at the Celtic Home Nations Cross Country Championships in 2023 and 2024, where she picked up a team silver medal for Ireland. Her achievements are far too many to list here tonight!

Clara is a sporting icon in Lumen Christi College. Her peers, especially the younger ones, aspire to be like her. She is very modest with all the achievements and is an asset to our city and local community, flying the flag of success in all she achieves.



Runners-Up Strike Martial Arts



The Team at Strike Martial Arts were chosen as runners-up for the Contribution to Sport Award for setting a high standard for kickboxing in Ireland and encouraging other teams. Twelve members joined Team Ireland at the World Championships in Germany in 2023. To raise the money to travel to Germany, they organised bag-packing events, raffles and kickathons. They support other clubs and share their talent and experience across the Northwest. They also support each other and have completed anti-bullying and mental health courses. While they haven't always got the results they wanted in competition, they have never been deflated by a loss. Instead, they take each loss as an opportunity to learn, improve and move on.



Winner Mikey Harkin

Contribution to Sport Award Winner Mikey Harkin was nominated for his football in talent and how he supports his team. Mikey signed for Derry City in January of 2022 and finished as their top goal scorer. In September of 2022 when he was just 15 years old, he was selected to play for Northern Ireland in Poland. He was also selected for the County Derry Super Cup team and was playing in the Northern Ireland Schoolboy Cup when he was targeted by chants from the stands to 'break his leg.' Indeed, this was exactly what happened.

Despite his great disappointment at not being able to participate in the Super Cup that summer, he celebrated the success of his teammates when they went on to beat Man United and Tigers in the final and become champions. This experience made Mikey more determined to compete again and he has since returned and been selected to play for Northern Ireland in the Northern Ireland Under-18 team where he has scored in three out of four matches.

Mikey is also admired for the respect, care and support he gives to others. He goes out of his way to support those less confident in his year. When selecting teams, he often chooses a child who least expects to be picked first. On a daily basis, he helps a child with cerebral palsy to get ready for PE sessions and after school matches. He has also supported a child in the local community who had been bullied and helped them change their mindset and believe in themselves again.

Shaye Lily Harkin received a Contribution to Sport Award for many reasons. Shaye Lily excels in netball, football, park runs and hocky. Her passion for triathlon, which consists of swimming, cycling and running, highlights her commitment to sport, health and wellbeing.

But although Shaye Lily loves sports and gets a great deal of fulfilment out of it, the greatest winners are the people she shares a team with. Shaye Lily possesses a unique blend of qualities that contribute to her excellence on and off the field. She is self-confident and believes in her ability. Her inner assurance propels her to push boundaries, overcome challenges and strive for victory.

Despite her many achievements, she always remains humble, respects her opponents, appreciates teamwork, and fully understands that no one succeeds alone. She creates a positive environment for others and encourages their personal growth. As such, she is an inspiration to others.

The Volunteering Award

The four finalists for the Volunteering Award will make you wonder how they can fit in their voluntary work with their school work! They are shining examples of how generous young people can be with their time and energy and how much our local community is richer because of their work.

Runner-Up Caitlin McGranaghan

From a young age, runner-up Caitlin McGranahan has shown an interest in helping people. She began volunteering for the On the Streets Community Youth Group three years ago and is now employed by them as an assistant Youth Support worker on a part time basis.

She provides positive experiences and learning opportunities and delivers programmes to youths in areas like mental health and wellbeing coping strategies.

Caitlin is also a volunteer with Crossing Boarders EA, a programme that educates and empowers young people to become active global citizens.

They coordinated and attended bi-monthly meetings to discuss issues faced by the different year groups, and reported their findings to the steering group.

At present they are taking training on children's rights and will deliver a child friendly assembly on the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child.



Winner Christian Kelly

Christian Kelly received the Volunteering Award for his work locally and internationally. Locally, he volunteers as a Youth Worker in Leafair, helping to run projects for young people on issues like health, bullying, crime, drugs, and sports. Christian is enrolled in NASA's Internship Programme, and his goal is to become the first Irish astronaut, inspiring the next generation, especially those in Ireland and other small nations.

His love of service has granted him early admission with a full scholarship to California's acclaimed Stanford University.
